Since the age of 6, Mr. Nucleus Johnson has been reciting the infamous words spoken by Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Trained by his father, Nucleus began to not only recite the words that moved a nation, but took on the demeanor and posture of the man who was determined to see the dream in all of us. As a result of his dedication to Dr. King's legacy, Mr. Johnson was requested in 2003 by Coretta Scott King to speak at Ebenezer Baptist Church during the nationally televised Annual MLK Commemorative Celebration at the ripe age of 14 where he received the blessing of Mrs. King for keeping her late husband's legacy alive. His voice and ability to reverberate the words of the Reverend Dr. King transformed Mrs. Scott King and the listening audience back to the place where they first heard those words. Impressed by his dedication to the craft and ability carry the legacy of Dr. King Coretta inscribed her hope for his continuation of the words that had an impact on so many lives. Determined to keep the powerful and transcending words of Dr. King alive Nucleus Johnson has recited these famous words for audiences of all kinds including the National Alliance of Black School Educators (NABSE), Viterbo University, the White Privilege Conference, Ebenezer Baptist Church, and Wartburg College to name a few. Those who have experienced Mr. Johnson's voice has described it as transformative, nostalgic, and impactful. Audiences are amazed by Nucleus' ability to capture the cadences and mannerisms of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King.

"Three Dimensions of a Complete Life" (Purpose & Greatness)

This sermon was delivered by Dr. King at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church on January 24, 1954, during which he focused on

- Inward concern for one's own welfare
- Outward concern for others, and
- Upward reach for God.

"Why Jesus Called a Man a Fool" (Family & Mental Health)

Vibrantly delivered on August 27, 1967, Mr. Johnson delivers this sermon with the purpose of echoing Dr. King warnings to his audience not to

- Don't allow the means by which you live to out distance the ends for which you live.
- Don't fail to realize your dependence on others
- Don't fail to realize your dependence on God

"The Drum Major Instinct" (Social Justice)

Just as Dr. King delivered this sermon in Atlanta, Georgia on February 4, 1968, Mr. Johnson helps his audience understand

- How to strive to be first in love
- The problems that come from only caring about yourself, and
- He who is greatest among you shall be your servant.
